



Ashton Cinema or Plaza



Ashton Cinema also known as The Plaza on North Street, Bedminster. S.F. Harris was the first owner. It closed in 1954, although the building survives today.


Castle Street Picture Theatre


Clare Street Picture House


Eastville Hippodrome


Gem Cinema


The Granada Cinema


Hotwells Cinema Theatre


King's Hall


The Metropole Cinema


Portview Picture Theatre


The Premier


Redcliffe Hall Picture Palace



Located on Redcliff Hill. It was considered to be one of Bristol's worst fleapits. The building was completely destroyed during the Blitz in 1941.


The Globe



The Globe Cinema was located on the north side of Church Road. It had an entrance on the corner of Jane Street. It was demolished in the mid 1970s.


Vestry Hall


Clifton Cinema
